Please note that the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic may necessitate a revision of the format of course offerings and academic schedules. Students who express to their instructor that they, or a reference to their name or person, do not wish to be recorded may discuss possible alternatives or accommodations with their instructor.

1 Course Notes:

Students must buy the 'fillable' lecture notes for this course at the University Bookstore (cost about \$35). (No textbook required).

2 What to have with you while watching the lectures:

- The fillable lecture notes that you bought at the University Bookstore.
- Blank paper, pens/pencils.
- Scientific calculator, graphing calculator (optional, but recommended).

3 Calendar Description:

This course is primarily intended for business and economics students. The course is designed to introduce and reinforce the essential mathematical skills needed to understand, analyze, and solve business-related mathematical problems. Topics covered include basic algebra; functions, including a review of exponential and logarithmic functions; sequences and series with financial applications; limits; continuity; and differential calculus including derivatives, higher order derivatives, and curve sketching.

4 Learning Outcomes:

- Demonstrate understanding of pre-Calculus including basic algebra.
- Demonstrate a thorough grounding of elementary functions.
- Demonstrate the ability to sketch and interpret a wide variety of graphs.
- Demonstrate understanding of elementary Differential Calculus.
- Demonstrate how to apply mathematics to some simple financial problems.

5 Online quizzes:

Online quizzes will be accessible via the CourseLink “quizzes” section. There will be six online quizzes over the course of the semester. All quizzes will be available for you to take at 8:00 AM (Toronto time) on the specified day in the schedule. All quizzes will be due by 11:59 PM (Toronto time) on the specified day in the schedule.

The first quiz is based on a high-school algebra review, posted in the Content section of CourseLink. **Students should work through the review as soon as possible to prepare for the quiz.** Students should also work through the Chapter 2 material in the lecture notes on their own. This material will not be covered in any of the lectures. The completed notes for Chapter 2 are posted in the Content section of CourseLink.

There is no time limit to complete quiz #1, and this quiz can be taken as many times as you like (within the allowed dates). Your highest grade out of all attempts will be recorded.

Quizzes #2–6 will cover the remainder of the course topics (see the schedule on CourseLink). **Each of these remaining five quizzes will allow three attempts each, and each attempt will have a one-hour time limit. Your highest grade out of the three attempts on a particular quiz will be recorded.**
